

Recorded for and at the request of Mrs
Anna White Widow this 14th of April 1786.

This Indenture made the Thirtieth Day of June in the Eighth Year of the Independence of the State of New York and in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, Between Isaac Stoutenburgh and Philip Van Cortlandt Esquires Commissioners of Forfeitures for the Southern District of the said State. Appointed in pursuance of an Act of the Legislature of the said State, entitled "An Act for the speedy Sale of the Confiscated and Forfeited Estates within this State, and for other purposes therein mentioned" passed the Twelfth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, of the One part, and Anna White Widow & Relict of Thomas White late of the City of New York Merchant deceased of the other part. Witnesseth that the said Isaac Stoutenburgh and Philip Van Cortlandt Commissioners as aforesaid, by virtue of the power and Authority to them in and by the said Act granted; and for and in Consideration of the sum of Three thousand five hundred Pounds lawful Money of the said State to them in hand paid by the said Anna White the Receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted, bargained, Sold, enfeoffed and confirmed and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell, enfeoff and confirm unto the said Anna White and to her Heirs and Assigns, All those several Lots of Ground situate in the North Ward of the said City in the Garden or place commonly called the Vineyard, which became vested in the People of this State by the Attainder of the said Thomas White, And all and singular the Estate, Right, Title and Interest, whether in Possession Reversion or Remainder of in or to the said premises, which in consequence of any conviction or attainder is become forfeited, or attached to or vested in the People of the said State, To have and to hold all and singular the said premises hereby granted, bargained, Sold, Enfeoffed and Confirmed, with the Appurtenances unto the said Anna White and to her Heirs and Assigns, to the only proper use, Benefit and Behoof of the said Anna White and to her Heirs and Assigns forever. In Witness whereof the parties to these presents have hereunto interchangeably set their Hands and seals the Day and Year first above written, Isaac Stoutenburgh (S), Ph. V. Cortlandt (S). Sealed and delivered in the presence of us, Sam^l. Dodge, James Teller. Be it remembered that on the Twenty fourth Day of November One thousand seven hundred and eighty four personally came and appeared before me Richard Morris Esquire Chief Justice of the State of New York the above named Isaac Stoutenburgh and Philip Van Cortlandt Esquires, and each of them respectively acknowledged that he had executed the above Indenture by sealing and Delivering thereof as

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his voluntary Act and Deed for the uses and purposes therein mentioned and
having examined the said Indenture, and found no material Erasures or
Interlineations therein do allow the same be Recorded. R^d Morris.

To all to whom these presents shall come. I Marinus Willett
Esquire Sheriff of the City and County of New York send Greeting. Whereas
on the thirtieth Day of October in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven
hundred and eighty four, a certain Writ of the People of the State of
New York called a *Fieri Facias* issued out of the Supreme Court of
Judicature of the State of New York aforesaid to the Sheriff of the said
City and County of New York directed and delivered (I the said Marinus
Willett then and yet Sheriff of the said City and County being) at the suit of
William Creed whereby I the said Sheriff was commanded that of the Goods &
Chattels Lands and Tenements of John Livingston in my Bailiwick I should
cause to be made Four hundred and thirty eight Pounds current
Money of New York which the said William Creed lately in the said Court
before the People aforesaid at the City of Albany had recovered against him
the said John Livingston of Debt, and also Eighteen pounds twelve shillings
and three pence which to the said William lately in the said Court were ad-
judged for his Damages which he had sustained as well by occasion of detain-
ing that Debt as for his Costs and Charges by him about that Suitin that behalf
expended whereof the said John was convicted as appears of Record and that
I the said Sheriff should have those Monies before the said People on the
third Tuesday in January then next ensuing wheresoever they should then
be in the State aforesaid to render to the said William for his Debt and
Damages aforesaid. And that I should also have then and there that Writ.
And whereas I the said Marinus Willett by virtue of the said Writ did
seize and levy on a certain Lot of Ground belonging to the said John
Livingston situate lying and being within my Bailiwick and herein after
more particularly described, and to the end that a fair and open Sale
should be made thereof I the said Sheriff did duly Advertise the Sale
thereof to be this Day, at which Sale Isaac Stoutenburgh of the said
City Merchant Bid for the premises aforesaid the sum of two hundred
red and thirty five Pounds current Money of the State aforesaid
no one bidding more the same were accordingly openly and public
cryed and struck off to him the said Isaac Stoutenburgh for the
last aforesaid. Now therefore know ye that I the said Marinus
